Sutton Scarsdale Hall – Clarke Family Property

Following our successful summer bus tour of former family residences of our school founders, in early November, the Association subsequently offered an opportunity for members and their partners to visit the grandest of these.

Once the property of one of the wealthiest men in Europe, Sutton Scarsdale Hall was the venue of a conducted tour led by fellow OC, Paul Halksworth, author of a definitive recently published book about property. The Hall, built 1724-1728 by the 4th. Earl of Scarsdale, Nicholas Leake employing the architect. Francis Smith of Warwick, was bought in 1740 by Godfrey Clarke of Somersall Hall, (one the locations included our earlier summer tour) and direct descendent of one of our founders.

The Clarke family sold it on at auction in 1824 to the son of Sir Richard Arkwright probably the richest commoner in Europe, for £216,000, today's equivalent of £23 million, for his son Robert. Paul also led us to the site of the medieval archery practice, the former gardens and the still intact ha ha, and explained to us how such an opulent residence suffered the transition from Riches to Ruin.

At the conclusion of the visit, we were invited by the churchwarden into the adjacent church for a welcome hot drink, much appreciated in view of the chill of a damp November afternoon!
